

Sample list of References, Referencing rules/ Pattern in brief

The References should be **Vancouver style or Numbered Style**. Referencing Pattern has to be uniform order and proper sequence.

REFERENCE CITATION

References Material cited in the Numeric style is identified by a number in square brackets [], beginning with 1 for the first citation and continuing in sequence till the last reference. For e.g.,

Gray [1] considers how to run an organization ...

Where a work has more than three authors, cite the name of the first author only, followed by, *et al.* as shown in the following example:

Stadler *et al.* [2] suggest in a study of flora ...

REFERENCE LIST

Journal References

All the Journal references should be arranged in the following sequence pattern:

Author(s) – Initials. Family name. *Journal title (in Italics)*. Volume(issue number). Year. Page number(s).

Examples of Journal references:

General Journal Reference

A. Metcalfe, V. Diaz. *Portal: Libraries and the Academy*. **3**(2). 2003. 191–206 p.

In Case of more than 3 Authors

J. Stadler, et al. *Ecography*. 23(2). 2000. 169–176p.

- The name of the Journal/document is to be given in either full or abbreviated form and *in italics*.
- In **multiple authorships**, where the number of authors are more than 3, only the name of first author is given, and it is followed by ‘et al.’

Online Journal

E. Gadd, C. Oppenheim, S. Proberts. *Ariadne*. (36). 2003. Available or Accessed 12 February 2004 (URL <http://www.ariadne.ac.uk/issue36/romeo/>).

Book References

All the Book references should be arranged in the following sequence pattern:

Author(s)– initials, Family name. *Title of Book (in italics)*. Edition. Place of publication: Publisher. Year. Page or chapter number(s). (Here page range and chapter number is not mandatory).

Examples of Books References:

1. G. Anthony. *UK public law and European law*. Oxford: Hart. 2002.
2. H. Cohen, H.G Rogers. *Gas Turbine Theory*. 4th Edn. Harlow: Longman. 1996.
